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



NOT THIS...or Spaghetti Hair... think in volume & mass, lay in shadows consistent with shape of head




Think of sections of hair like volumes and not strands. like a ribbon with shadow, halftone & highlight.




It doesn't look like hair but it does look 3 dimensional.

To make it look like hair add 4th element, TEXTURE.



Include stray strands that break of the edge between background and head.




Watch edges, places where hair connects to skin. Should not be outlined but should have gradations. Or it will look like a wig or clip on beard.





Add dark accents in shadowed area & gradations between light & dark. Will begin to look 3 dimensional



NOTICE that drawing the STRANDS is in the last step, NOT the first!



Color mixtures for all types of hair

Hair, its color and the way light affects it is a good way to examine color and come to some simple, logical conclusions about color mixing. All hair color is a form of yellow, from tow-haired to silver gray, from ash blonde to black. Where light strikes, all hair colors are warmed. Where light doesn't strike, all hair colors are cooled. Color reacts as we do to the sun: we're warmed by it and cooled by the shade. The color yellow has the broadest range of tone and intensity. It can be light and bright — like a lemon or blonde hair — or dark and dull: The color of mahogany or brunette hair. Yellow can be pale and light—like sand—or dark and seemingly black—the way we think of ebony. All these colors I've mentioned are forms of yellows. The shadows on all these colors are complementary to yellow and are made by the addition of a tone of violet. The shine of these colors is also made with violet in a very light tone. Shadows are always accented with darker versions of the mass tone color.

On our palettes, we have many yellows: The Cadmiums, the earth colors, such as Yellow Ochre, Burnt Umber, Raw Umber, Raw Sienna. These colors can be further extended with additions of white to lighten, and additions of black and white to mute. These colors can be tinged with reds for the redder versions of yellow hair, such as carrottops and Titian-colored tresses. Now for some general color mixtures:
